Project Definition Plan for Upgrades and new facilities for Como

It's wonderful to hear about the exciting developments at Como Secondary College! The allocation of \$650,000 from the State Budget for planning an upgrade is a significant step. This funding represents an exciting phase of development for Como and will provide a strategic master planning framework that will augment and enhance the high quality of education already being provided by the school.

At the last School Board meeting, board members attended a briefing by Rob Thomson and Steve Parry from the Infrastructure Directorate where they provided information regarding the first stage of this journey - the planning process.

Cabinet has requested that a Project Definition Plan be prepared to develop options for the school. The Project Definition Plan is a crucial initial step in the upgrade process. It identifies project delivery issues, risks, and outlines the scope, cost, schedule, and procurement strategies, providing a master plan for future upgrades of the school's aging infrastructure.

While the parameters are still being finalized, Christou Architecture has been appointed by the Department of Finance and will lead the planning process. Over the last three weeks various consultants have visited the school to assess existing site servicing and conduct building inspections. Their insights will inform the upgrade. The Project Plan is expected to be shared by the end of this year as it will inform future government decisions. We are very excited to take the first few steps towards this modernisation project, which will see us achieve the vision developed during the community consultation process.

Meeting with Perth Redbacks

In June Brad Francis (HOLA HPE) and I met with representatives from the Perth Redbacks to discuss support for a 12-court indoor sporting and community facility at 3 Barron Hay Court, Kensington. (The vacant Department of Agriculture land). Previously to this meeting there were discussions about using Como SC land to build indoor court facilities. However, due to several factors such as parking and the reduced number of courts that could be built at Como SC, a new site was chosen for the proposal.

There are several positive outcomes for Como SC should this proposal be actioned.

1 - Como SC is part of the Southeast Metro zone for interschool competitions. There is no one suitable venue for competition sports like in basketball, volleyball, badminton. This year our students are travelling to 1 of 8 different venues north of the river to compete in volleyball.

2 - Reduced costs due to decreased travel distances either for local or interstate competitions.

3 - There is no predicted impact on

community hiring the gym so this revenue stream will not be affected.

The Art Learning Area's second Cabaret illuminated the talents of Como's students, blending dance and music into a captivating performance that resonated with the audience. The success of these events speaks volumes of the hard work and passion of everyone involved, from the performers to the behind-the-scenes contributors, all of whom deserve a resounding BRAVO for creating memorable experiences and making a difference.

NAIDOCC WEEK

As part of NAIDOC a whole school event was held celebrating culture and encouraging understanding in our community. Special guests Gina Williams and Guy Ghouse connected and captivated the audience through music and song. Informed by the four principles of Koort (Heart), Moort (Family and Community), Boodja (Land) and Koorlangka (Children and Legacy) Gina and Guy took us on a journey we're not likely to forget. It really was a unique experience with Gina singing in the Noongar language.

The Noongar language is not something Gina grew up with. However, to sing and write in Noongar is a deliberate choice to help revive her culture and support it for generations to come. Noongar language is critically endangered (there are less than 400 recognised fluent speakers left).





A NAIDOC lesson was also delivered to the whole school where students examined and discussed this year's theme Keep the Fire Burning! Blak, Loud & Proud. The NAIDOC theme is chosen by the National NAIDOC Committee, with this year's theme honouring the enduring strength and vitality of First Nations culture – with fire a symbol of connection to Country, to each other, and to the rich tapestry of traditions that define Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. Students were then given the opportunity to share their vision for the future and reconciliation.

Other events for NAIDOC included several basketball matches for students with senior students taking on the teachers and braiding bracelets in the colours of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

NAIDCO provides an opportunity for all Australians to learn about our shared histories, achievements and cultures and to continue to explore how each of us can contribute to achieving reconciliation in Australia. It is celebrated not only in Indigenous communities, but by Australians from all walks of life. NAIDCO is a great opportunity to participate in a range of activities and to support local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

The Smoking Ceremony is a traditional Noongar ritual used to not only cleanse and purify a specific area but cleanse the spirit, body and soul whilst you are on Noongar Country. It also helps to ward off warra wirrin – bad spirits and to bring in the blessings of the kwop wirrin – good spirits.

The smouldering leaves and smoke purify the area and prepares for a new beginning. This ritual of purification and unity – signifies the beginning of something new.

Everyone gathered around George to take part in the ceremony, a fabulous way to embrace Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture and to start the holidays.









Celebrating NAIDOC Week

NAIDOC week celebrates the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. It is celebrated by all Australians and is a great opportunity to recognise

and learn more about the history and culture of indigenous communities.

NAIDOC stands for National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee. Its origins can be traced back to the Aboriginal rights movement, when on Australia Day 1938, protestors marched through the streets of Sydney to highlight the status and treatment of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Australians. Today, it is a week-long celebration held in July that consists of range of traditional and contemporary activities.

NAIDOC Week is an important event that helps build positive relationships between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people. It enables a deeper understanding of our differences and similarities. NAIDOC week is an opportunity for all Australians to eliminate bias and discrimination by reflecting and reconciling the wrongs of the past to facilitate hope and build a fairer future. Families are encouraged to join in and support young people in learning the significance of NAIDOC Week.

POLLY FARMER FOUNDATION'S FOLLOW THE DREAM

Polly Farmer Foundation's Follow the Dream program was named program of the year at the NAIDOC Perth Awards last week. The award recognises not-for-profit organisations delivering outstanding programs to the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community in Perth.

Follow the Dream is a worthy winner, delivering culturally responsive academic enrichment to aspirant Indigenous students through tuition and mentoring, designed to develop knowledge, confidence, self-belief, and inspire students to achieve through their school and career aspirations.

The outcomes of Follow the Dream across all sites are remarkable with indicators of success including 83% attendance rate, 95% year 12 graduation, 75% WACE and 76% of graduates proceeding into employment or further study. New independent research has also identified less tangible outcomes from the program including 88% of graduates agreeing Follow the Dream helped them become more confident, 96% choosing more aspirational post school pathways, 75% enjoying school more, and 100% agreeing the program helped them to "follow their dream".

The marketing of snus and nicotine pouches targets young audiences through social media influencers, raising concerns about their increasing popularity among school students. And like vapes, they come in various flavours and strengths, with unregulated nicotine levels leading to inconsistent and misleading labelling. It is clear that SLT products contain not only nicotine, but also other chemicals with unknown long-term effects.

SPECIAL REPORT: Smokeless Tobacco Products

The evolving nicotine landscape requires parents and caregivers to stay informed to protect young people from these emerging threats. Snus and nicotine pouches are gaining popularity among young people as smokeless tobacco (SLT) products. Both products are discreetly placed under the upper lip, allowing nicotine absorption through the gums.

Health authorities are urging proactive measures to curb this growing trend and calling on regulators to implement controls before these products become as widespread as vapes. The high nicotine






















ENRICHED MATHS, INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY AND SCIENCE

It is also a venue for parents to voice concerns, raise issues and discuss ideas both with the Principal and with other parents.

Second-Hand Uniform Shop

The second-hand uniform shop is run by the P&C with all funds raised going towards projects to benefit all students. The shop is run on donations only.

It is located in B Block and open during term each Friday, 8.30-9.15am. Nonstudents need to sign in at the front office where staff will assist to locate the shop.

No longer required, preloved uniform items in good condition can be dropped at reception 8am-4 pm Mon-Fri.
